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


#### Level 3 · Becoming independent

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
## Giant Panda!


Look! Up in the tree!

Is it a cat? Is it a raccoon?

No! It's a giant panda!


Giant pandas can climb to the tops of the tallest trees. They live in the highest mountains. They munch on bamboo for hours each day.





Pandas are a type of bear, but they seem more like raccoons or cats. In China, pandas are sometimes called daxiongmao, which means "giant bear cat".

Like all bears, pandas are strong, intelligent animals with sharp teeth and a good sense of smell. Males weigh around 110 kg and are about 1.2 to 1.8 m long.



Wilder of Primary School

Pandas have lived high in the mountains of China for millions of years. It is cold and rainy, but there are plenty of trees and a panda's favourite plant – bamboo.

Pandas used to live in more places, but today there is less open land with bamboo. Now pandas live in six forest habitats in China.

# Panda Bodies

Pandas are black and white. This may help hide panda babies from predators, or enemies, in the snowy and rocky forest.

Their oily, woolly coat keeps them warm in the cold, wet forests where they live.

Hairs on the bottom of their feet keep them warm on the snowy ground.



Just like cats, pandas can see very well at night, when they are most active.

Pandas have large teeth and strong jaw muscles that are perfect for crushing tough stalks of bamboo.







### Bamboo Breakfast

Pandas spend their day sleeping a little and eating A LOT!

Bamboo for breakfast, bamboo for lunch, bamboo for dinner, and bamboo to munch. What do pandas eat? You guessed it – bamboo! It makes up almost all of a panda's diet.







Pandas mostly live alone. But sometimes they hang out in small groups.

Pandas use 11 different calls to communicate with each other.

They also leave their scent on rocks and trees for other pandas to find.



## Baby Steps


Around August or September, a mother panda will find a den and give birth. Her newborn cub is about the same size and weight as a mobile phone.



Panda cubs are pink, hairless and blind at birth. They spend the day squeaking, crying and drinking their mother's milk.



Cubs stay with their mothers until they are about two or three years old.



In a few weeks, the mother can leave her cub to find bamboo. The baby cries less and is able to keep itself warm.



When a cub is about eight weeks old, it will finally open its eyes. But the cub still cannot walk until it is three months old.







When the cub is six months old, it can eat bamboo, climb trees and walk around, just like its mother.

### Red Panda

When people think of pandas, they usually think of the giant panda. But did you know there is another kind?

Red pandas also live in China as well as other parts of Asia. They eat bamboo just like black-and-white pandas, but they also love roots and acorns. Red pandas only grow to be about the size of a cat.





Today, there are only about 1,600 pandas left in the wild. Many of the forests where pandas live have been cleared to make room for farms. Pandas have nowhere to go and no food to eat.

The Wolong Panda Reserve in China is just one way people are trying to help. The 150 pandas that live there cannot be harmed.






Pandas are also protected in zoos. The first pandas were brought to the United States from China in 1972. Today, there are about 100 red and giant pandas in zoos around the world.


In just one year, 16 cubs were born at the Wolong Panda Reserve.



At first it was hard for giant panda mums to have cubs in zoos and on reserves. But in recent years, there has been a panda boom. Let's hear it for the cubs!



In May 2008, a giant earthquake struck China. The centre of the earthquake was right near the Wolong Panda Reserve. Rocks the size of cars rained down from the steep mountains surrounding the pandas' home. Since then, a new centre has been built to house the homeless pandas. Hooray!
